



How do I get to GaleNet LRC?

Open your web browser and go to the Library website <http://library.hiu.edu> > **Research Databases** > scroll to **Literature section** > **Choose GaleNet Literature Resource Center (LRC)**.

Note: If you are off-campus, you will need to login before proceeding. To login you will be asked for your Hope ID number and your password. Your password will be the first 3 letters of your first name and the first 3 letters of your last name (e.g. Mary Johnson's password would be marjoh). Please contact the Technical Services Librarian at 714/879-3901 ext. 1212 if you have difficulty accessing the Research Databases from off-campus.

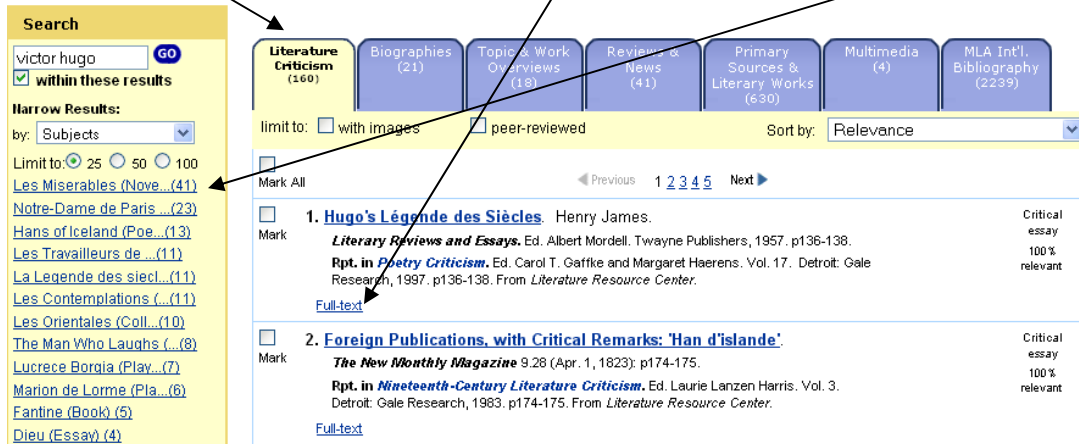
By clicking **Literature Resource Center (LRC)** you will automatically be searching the LRC database *and* the MLA database.

How do I search by author name?

Using the **Basic Search** screen, type the author name into the **Find:** search box and click the **Search for words in:** radio button for **Person – By or About**.



You will retrieve a list that includes **Literature Criticism, Biographies, Topic & Work Overviews, Reviews & News, Primary Sources & Literary Works, Multimedia,** and **MLA Intl. Bibliography** citations. **Click the appropriate tab** to see results for each category. You can further refine your search using the **subject links** on the left side of the screen. To access articles, click the **Full-text** link.



How do I search by title of work?

Using the **Basic Search** screen, type the title of the work into the **Find:** search box and click the **Search for words in:** radio button for **Name of Work**.



How do I print or email articles that I find in GaleNet LRC?

First open an article by clicking the **Full-text** link to that article (see graphic included on this handout under "How do I search by author name" for example of Full-text link). Once you have the article open, use the links in the **Tools** box to **Print**, **Email**, or **Download** the article.

How do I cite articles I find in GaleNet LRC in the Works Cited page of my paper?

Citing articles found in an electronic database such as GaleNet LRC can be difficult. GaleNet provides **Citation Tools** to help you cite articles found in their database. First open an article by clicking the **Full-text** link to that article (see graphic included on this handout under "How do I search by author name" for example of Full-text link). Once you have the article open, use the **Citation Tools** link in the **Tools** box to generate a citation.
